Items 1-7 were considered and the opinion of the Planning Services accepted except where stated otherwise.

APPLICATION NO D/2010/0356/F – APPROVAL

The application, brought before Council in May 2012, was deferred for an office meeting with objectors following which the Department consulted in depth with all relevant consultees. The Planning Officer advised that the Department has, over the period of a year, considered the detailed and numerous submissions made by residents and action groups and whilst recognising that there are concerns, the Department's decision is that the application complies with and meets the requirements of policies set out in PPS18.

The Chief Executive reported on receipt of a letter of support for the proposal from North Antrim MP Mr I Paisley.

Councillor Cavlan stated that she was deeply disappointed on behalf of the objectors with the decision to approve the application. She referred to the impact the application will have on the local community, the devaluation of properties in the area and the subsequent impact on Council in the reduction of rateable values of these properties. Councillor McAfee, whilst supporting renewable energy, concurred with Councillor Cavlan that the Department should consider the number of objections received. Councillor Blair also expressed this view.

Councillor Robinson requested clarification on noise levels and referred to the short distance from the proposed installation to the nearest dwelling. She stated that not enough concern has been shown to the residents.

Alderman Campbell expressed the view that it would be difficult to disagree with the Department's decision, made on planning grounds and following indepth multi-agency consultation. In stating his opposition for nuclear power as an alternative source of energy, Councillor Stevenson spoke in support of the application. Councillor McGuigan stated that whilst understanding the concerns of the residents and how they view the planning process, he would not be opposing the application.

The Planning Officer responded to a number of other questions relating to:

- Monitoring of performance and noise in conjunction with Environmental Health.
- Compliance of operators in accordance with conditions applied.
- Formulation of policy for objectors
- Removal of turbines after a 25 year period

Councillor Cavlan recorded her opposition to the decision of the Department to approve the application.

90.5 REGIONAL DAY OPPORTUNITIES MODEL FOR ADULTS WITH LEARNING DISABILITY – CONSULTATION

90.6 NORTHERN IRELAND FIRE & RESCUE SERVICE (NIFRS) DRAFT PREVENTION AND PROTECTION STRATEGY 2014-2019

Northern Ireland Fire & Rescue Service (NIFRS) has developed a draft Prevention and Protection Strategy 2014-2019. This draft strategy sets out how NIFRS will protect the public and business community in NI from the dangers of fire and other emergencies.

In particular the strategy will describe how the NIFRS will

- Measure the risk from fire and other emergencies to the people of Northern Ireland and describe how it will use this information to help decide on where, how and when it will deliver its services.
- Work to educate and inform the community of the dangers of fire and in doing so help prevent fires and other emergencies from happening'
- Work in partnership with other services, stakeholders and volunteers to help deliver a safer community;
- Prioritise our prevention work to work most closely with those most at risk;
- Engage with all sections of our community, in particular those most at risk of becoming involved in offending behavior;
- Carry out a risk-based audit programme to measure fire safety in noddomestic premises;
- Take steps to educate stakeholders to help reduce the risk in non-domestic premises and provide professional advice on matters relating to Fire Safety; and

• Enforce The Fire and Rescue Services (Northern Ireland) Order 2006 and The Fire Safety Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2010.

NIFRS are seeking views of potential stakeholders affected by the strategy and are carrying out a screening consultation as part of its statutory requirement under Section 75 of the Northern Ireland Act. As a public sector body it is required to consult with people/bodies that may be affected by its strategies. Further information including the policy and a feedback questionnaire can be found at www.nifrs.org/consultation.

If Council wishes to discuss the strategy further, meetings with the policy lead officer can be arranged. The closing date for receipt of comments is Tuesday 21st January 2014. Following the close of consultation a summary of responses plus details of any further strategy revision as result of this exercise will be available on the NIFRS website from February 2014.

90.7 INPATIENT BASED ADDICTION TREATMENT SERVICES – NORTHERN HEALTH & SOCIAL CARE BOARD – CONSULTATION

A consultation process on the proposed reconfiguration of inpatient services for adults requiring addiction treatment has been launched by the Health and Social Care Board.

The purpose of the consultation is to consider how specialist in-patient beds, used for the treatment of those with alcohol and substance misuse, could be better organised to improve the services provided throughout Northern Ireland.

During the consultation period, the Board will seek the views of patients, clients, families, carers and the general public to help inform decisions about these proposals for the future development and delivery of these important services.

This will include a series of public meetings which will be held:

90.8 BALLYMONEY POST OFFICE

Post Office has confirmed that it is proceeding with the relocation of the Ballymoney Post Office branch to Glebeside Spar, 22 John Street, Ballymoney, BT53 6DS, where it will operate as one of our new Main style Post Office branches.

A small number of comments were received from customers and local representatives during the local public consultation period. The majority of comments were supportive of the move as customers welcomed the close proximity of parking facilities and the longer opening times that would be available at the proposed site. However some respondents expressed concern about the proposed location as they would have to travel further to access Post Office services.

While the Post Office appreciate that the proposed branch is approximately 380 metres away from the current site and for some customers this may mean a slightly longer journey for them, equally, there may be some customers for whom the branch is more ideally situated than at present. In situations such as this, there may be some customers who are more inconvenienced than others and the Post Office only apologise for this.

The new premises will undergo a major refurbishment to incorporate a new main style Post Office with a convenience store. Post Office will be working closely with their operator to plan the interior layout of the Post Office counter area, to optimize the use of the space within the store. This will ensure that access into and inside the store is level, kept clear and free of obstacles and the Post Office counter area is easily accessible and customers including wheelchair users have sufficient space and privacy whilst conducting their business.

Internally, there will be a dedicated Post Office area incorporating screened and open plan positions. There will also be a Post Office serving point located at the retail till, enabling customers to carry out a wide range of Post Office products and services alongside retail transactions. Post Office customers will benefit from the longer opening hours provided by our operator, including Saturday afternoon and even longer opening at the Post Office serving point located at the retail till so that customers have more flexibility and can access our services at times that suit them better.

Posters will now be displayed in branch to let customers know about this decision. Post Office anticipate the move to take place in April next year and further posters will be provided in branch at that time to let customers know the actual date the move will take place. This change to the Post Office network is being carried out in accordance with the Code of Practice for changes to the network, as agreed with Consumer Focus, the national consumer organisation. Councillor Stevenson advised members that he has been in contact with Roads Service relating to provision of a pedestrian crossing at Café Lane to assist Post Office users.

It was proposed by Councillor Stevenson, seconded by Councillor Finlay and AGREED:

That Council write to Roads Service requesting that they provide a pedestrian crossing at Café Lane, Ballymoney.

90.9 CHARITY COMMISSION

The Charity Commission for Northern Ireland has opened a consultation on its interim reporting proposals for all newly registered charities – and is calling on you to have your say.

At present, charities are not required to submit annual accounts and reports to the Commission for inspection. This will change after compulsory registration of charities begins later this year, with annual reporting by charities playing an important role in the Commission's regulation and monitoring work.

To make the annual reporting process as accessible as possible, the reporting requirements for all newly registered charities in Northern Ireland will be introduced on a phased basis.

Under phase one – the interim requirements – registered charities will have to submit an annual return, including their annual accounts and reports in the format they currently prepare them, to the Commission for annual inspection.

with Alderman Campbell's remarks. Councillor Robinson expressed the view that the majority of Councils in the Province now have unelected, professional members who, whilst unable to vote, bring benefits to the Committee. Councillor McKeown supported Councillor Robinson's view on the matter.

The Chief Executive responded advising members that this matter can be placed on the agenda for review if required.

It was proposed by Councillor Robinson, seconded by Councillor Finlay and AGREED:

that council delegate authority to the Audit Committee to approve the report to those charged with governance and to sign off the amended 2012/13 Financial Statements.
